

The 2017 OSBMA Spring Workshop was held on Tuesday April 4th at the Ohio Department of Transportation, Columbus, Ohio. Trooper Joel Smith, with the Ohio State Highway Patrol, talked about Licensing and Commercial Standards. Stephen Puchta, with the Office of Pupil Transportation and Ohio Department of Education, introduced himself and thanked the Ohio School Bus Mechanics for all they do to keep Ohio's Students safe.

Dave Brewster and Jon Davies with W.W.Williams were presenters for the first session. Jon Davies talked about Allison Transmissions and some of the issues they have experienced along with answers and fixes. He also touched on Allison DOC, Fuel Sence and PTS Promo . Dave Brewster talked about the Evolution of W.W.Williams , Pain or Gain and the Wheel Time Network.

Frank Byrd and Steve Kelshaw with Leece-Neville were presenters for the second session and spoke about the electrical system on Buses and Trucks. Frank reviewed the basics when diagnosing a faulty battery or alternator. He also talked about different test equipment used for properly checking the charging system.


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TIPS & TRICKS

Here is a tip for anyone having issues with headlights, front turn signals or parking lights on 2007-2015 Blue Bird Visions. I had a bus come in with a parking light out, so I pulled the bulb, put a new one in and it still did not work. I grabbed my test light and found no power at bulb socket. I traced the wire back to the harness (which is directly under the hood hinge as shown in this picture). You can see where the harness had been rubbed through and broke the wire. The wiring harness connector itself is not in a very good location, as water will find its way inside and corrode the terminals.

I have had half a dozen buses give me the same problem, so if it's not a bad bulb, check that harness close to the hood hinge or the harness connector itself.

Construction Standards

I had the opportunity to represent the Ohio School Bus Mechanics Association on the Ohio School Bus Construction Standards Advisory Committee at the quarterly meeting on March 24, 2017. This meeting is presided over by the Licensing and Commercial Standards Division of the Ohio State Highway Patrol. The remainder of the committee is made up of representatives from all School Bus Manufacturers and Ohio School Bus Dealers. The committee is also made up of Invitees that the OSHP determines have an active role in safe pupil transportation in Ohio, such as representatives from ODE, OAPT, OSBMA, OSBA, NHTSA just to name a few.

For those unfamiliar with this meeting, it is where the Advisory Committee reviews current constructions standards, as well as applications for new (or changes to existing) equipment on school buses as per OAC 4501-5-04. The committee also reviews the existing construction standards to evaluate if items no longer need to be in the minimum construction standards because these items are no longer needed or no longer deemed safe for use on school buses. Two of the items that have been have eliminated from the construction standards are the pry bar, and split rim wheels. I am sure there are more those are just the ones that come to mind.

Any manufacturer, dealer, or owner of a school bus who wishes to change or add options or make any changes to the Ohio School Bus Construction Standards must request permission, prior to the installation of new or additional equipment, from the director, as per OAC 4501-5-04. An item added to the latest approved options list is a Fire Suppression System.

This committee is our direct link to making changes to school buses in Ohio and possibly the rest of the country. The mechanics throughout the state have firsthand experience in what it takes to maintain the safest mode of transportation in the country. We also have access to impact change through our local MVI Team or LCS district office.

We as mechanics have firsthand experience with this vital part of student education in the state of Ohio and to some extent the rest of the country. You can access the most up to date Ohio School Bus Construction Standards & School Bus Approved Options List is at www.statepatrol.ohio.gov under the Publications heading.



Position: Mechanic


How long have you been with the OSBMA and what titles have you held?
